What has been your career path up until now?

I joined LIFFE on a IT graduate scheme after graduating from IC, after which I came to Winton Capital and was trained to become a trader. Currently I am working on redesigning a trading tool for the Traders.

What does your job involve?

Trading: Life on the desk is pretty intensive (and fun!) and some days can go past in a flash. Winton has a 24 hour trading desk where we trade 140+ markets. As well as working trades electronically we liaise with Brokers/Banks to get the best prices available. In addition we are analysing markets for profitable spread trades and keeping tabs on news and figures that are published by governments. On top of this there are times when a discrepancy may arise that has to be dealt with deftly. With all this going on, I would say that the key skills required would be: the ability to prioritise

tasks, be aware of market conditions across a number of sectors (how government data affects the market, how markets affect one another, etc), basic IT skills, the ability to communicate clearly and succinctly, and finally... keep a cool head.


Trading Technologies: Recently I've made the transition into a more IT orientated role within Winton after 3+ years of trading. Over time, as we create and support more in-house systems within Winton, I decided to take a more active role in these technologies that were being introduced. This also gave me the opportunity to dust off my programming boots from my IC and LIFFE days and expand upon my technical knowledge.

Do you use skills that you obtained during your Imperial course?

The abilities that I use most predominantly in my current role that I honed at Imperial would be the analytical, technical, and programming skills.

What are your future plans?

In the immediate future I intend to expand and refine my current skill set of programming languages. On a longer term basis, I would like to utilise this knowledge (as well as my trading experience) to influence the tools and technologies in use at Winton.
