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<b>Programme Overview</b>
<p>Bioengineering is at the interface of engineering and medicine. Bioengineering is a discipline that advances knowledge in engineering, biology and medicine, and improves human health through cross-disciplinary activities that integrate the engineering sciences with the biomedical sciences and clinical practice.</p> <p>The MRes Bioengineering is a one year full-time programme leading to the MRes award. Students of the programme will benefit from interaction with students on other programmes on the Department to develop their interdisciplinary knowledge.</p> <p>The programme involves lectures and practical work in the first term, followed by full-time work on a research project. A variety of seminars and workshops are provided to deepen and broaden the students' research skill-base. The programme will prepare students to analyse and solve problems in bioengineering using an integrated, multidisciplinary approach.</p> <p>Usually the MRes research project would be supervised by at least two supervisors with different expertise. Supervisors may be drawn from any department across the College. Some students may also have a co-supervisor from industry.</p> <p>Students have the opportunity to take additional modules and short workshops in the 2nd and 3rd terms and will attend seminars and journal clubs throughout the year, as well as mini-symposia.</p>

Marking Scheme
<p>There are two elements – taught element, and project element.</p> <p>In order to pass the MRes, a student must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Achieve an aggregate of at least 50% in each element</li> <li>• Pass each module at 50%. <i>At the discretion of the Exam Board, up to 15 ECTS worth of modules having marks below 50% may be awarded a compensated pass as long as their respective element mark is 50% or greater.</i></li> </ul> <p>In order to gain a Merit classification, a student must achieve an aggregate of at least 60% in each element.</p> <p>In order to gain a Distinction classification, a student must achieve an aggregate of at least 70% in each element.</p>
